Serendipitous Philately

If You Collect German Stamps, It's Nice to Have a German Friend. by Bruce Mc Pherson

In 1968 I accepted a position as Manufacturing Engineering Manager at Essex International. The facility was located in Zanesville, Ohio, the home of Zane Gray. Essex had been awarded the contracts to manufacture the first column mounted ignition switches in the automotive business, from both Ford and General Motors. As usual, by the time the manufacturer is given the go-ahead the planning and engineering sections have over-run their time allotments but the date to have the components ready for final assembly never changes. Essex was anxious for me to start immediately. My wife was still in Indianapolis, and in fairness to her employers she needed to stay and train her replacement. So I was behind schedule

when I started the job and needed to find a place to live. Essex arranged for a very adequate room at the local Motel where I lived for several months. My evening meal at the local restaurant was routine and I became friendly with another man that had a similar routine.

My new friend was personable, short, heavy, smoked cigars and had a German accent. His name was Danny Blumenthal. He was born and lived in Bremen until 1939, when Hitler was not being very nice to Jewish people. His father, mother, brother, and Danny were scheduled to leave Germany by ship but were stopped by the Gestapo prior to boarding. However, Danny managed to get on board and sailed for South America. His family was left behind. Within a year they were put to death. Danny worked his way through school and became an electrical engineer. His skills brought him to Zanesville.

And wouldn't you know, he collected German stamps. He carried his collection with him as he moved about. He had a nice collection and I learned a lot from him. Particularly since he could read and write in German and I could not. He was very helpful when it came to translating the notes in the German Michel catalog.

After several years in Zanesville I moved to Ithaca New York to work for NCR Corporation and Danny return to Germany to retire. We maintained our relationship by mail for about five years before he became terminally ill. Each year I would send him all of the U.S. stamps issued for the year and he would reciprocate by sending all of the new German stamps.
