
The USS Arcadia by Phil Fettig

Three U.S. Navy ships have been named USS ARCADIA. The first was a small Motor Patrol Gunboat that served from 1917-1919. Very little information is available. The second was a Cargo Ship built in 1896 in Ireland for the German Government. After World War I, the U.S. received this ship from Germany and she was commissioned the USS ARCADIA (ATF). This vessel carried supplies until she was returned to the U.S. Government Shipping Board, having served in the U.S. Navy for less than one year. In September 1945, the third USS ARCADIA (AD-23) was commissioned and placed into service as a Destroyer Tender. This type of ship provided all types of mechanical and supply service to U.S. Navy Destroyers serving around the world. The ARCADIA performed several missions and was placed into reserve status as the global situation changed. In January 1968, USS ARCADIA was decommissioned for the final time and was broken up for scrap in August 1974.

Figure (1) shows a post World War II cancel. For the most part the informative information usually contained in the "Killer Bars" part of the cancel disappeared during WWII and never returned except for very special occasions. Figure (2) is a postcard that shows the USS ARCADIA with a Destroyer alongside.
