What does the World Columbian Expo and Frederick Olmstead have in Common?



Most stamp collectors are aware of the Columbian issue of sixteen postage stamps (January 1893) commemorating the 1893 World Columbian Exposition in Chicago. These were the first United States Commemorative stamps. The unsold stamps were destroyed in 1894.

But are stamp collectors aware of Frederick Law Olmstead, the World Columbian Exposition landscape architect, who was responsible for changing the natural features of the area and making it more attractive? His successes are New York Central Park, the Biltmore Estate in North Carolina, and the grounds around the Capitol in Washington, D.C.

He was involved in 1886 in laying out Boston's Emerald Necklace and eventually, after the exposition closed, he redesigned the area as Jackson Park.

Yosemite, in California, owes its establishment as a public park to the chairman of its Commis-

sion...Olmstead. On September 12, 1999 a U.S. stamp picturing Olmstead, was issued.

A good read is the bestseller, <u>The Devil in the White City</u> by Eric Larson published in 2003 which has much to say about the exposition as well as Olmstead. Its subtitle is "Murder, Magic and Madness at the Fair that Changed America".

In May 1992 the United States Postal Service celebrated the 500th anniversary of the voyages of Christopher Columbus. This set is based on the first U.S. stamps in commemorative format engraved a century ago.


A Moment in Time by Phil Fettig

Last week I was cleaning out a box of "Philatelic Treasures" and found a small stack of postcards that brought back memories of my younger days. For that reason, I am going to head down a different road for a few issues. One of my first memories of Florida was a visit to the "Million Dollar Pier" in St. Petersburg during a 1955 vacation. The 1st major pier built in the area was the "Electric Pier" in 1906. It was a privately owned effort that was strung with lights, thus its name. It was replaced in 1911 with a new pier built 10 feet away and was owned by the city. The major hurricane of 1921 caused extensive damage which caused its demolition. The city spent \$1,000,000 on its replacement and the "Million Dollar Pier" opened in 1926. In 1967 the pier needed extensive repairs which were completed with a reopening in 1973. From the appearance of the cars and the two U.S. Navy Destroyers shown in this card (Figure 1), I believe the photo was taken in the late 1920's.

My next stop is also in St. Pete, just a mile or so away from the pier – Bayboro Harbor. The local government struggled to develop the harbor area for



business purposes in the early 20th Century, however nearby Tampa got the attention. A major boost came during Prohibition with the U.S. Coast Guard Air Station opening in 1924 to combat smugglers. In 1939, the U.S. Maritime Service opened a training station where thousands were trained during World War II. The photo in Figure 2 would have been taken after 1939. In 1961 I enlisted in the U.S. Naval Reserve in a building that replaced the main one shown and spent many a Drill Weekend there over



the next three years. During the 1960's we attended many NY Yankee and St. Louis Cardinal Spring Training Games as the stadium was just a few blocks away. Also, in the mid-1970's, FLOREX was held less than a mile away.
