## What is in your Library? by Phil Fettig

Unlike the commercial on television, I'm not interested in what is in your wallet, only your Philatelic Library. No matter what your collecting interest is, somewhere there are books that can help your efforts and increase your pleasure.

I will start with books for the general worldwide collector. Linn's Stamp Identifier (Figure 1, on Front Cover) is a small reference, but is packed with information. You do not need to be fluent in foreign languages, just look up the stamp inscription in the alphabetical listing. Next are alphabet tables and then 70 pages of illustrations. This has a low price and is readily available.

Next is This is Philately by Kenneth A. Wood (Figure 2, on Front Cover). This three volume set contains much of the information in the Linn's identifier but has a multitude of additional topics. Information is provided on technical aspects of stamp production, stamp collecting terms and maps, just to mention a few. This reference is out of print, but can be located online starting around $\$ 40.00$ and is a welcome addition to any philatelic library.

The last mention for the general collector is a real masterpiece of philatelic knowledge. Fundamentals of Philately (Figure 3, on Front Cover) by L.N. Williams is published by the American Philatelic Society. This large book covers paper, watermarks, design, printing, ink and gum, among other subjects, in great depth. It is available from several sources, starting with the APS, and at a variety of cost from $\$ 40-\$ 60$.

Everybody is familiar with Scott's Catalogs that cover the world. There are many other specialized catalogs that cover individual foreign countries. They are very helpful, even in non-English formats. You can search online to find these items, look up philatelic book dealers, or if you need help to get started, just ask me.

For the U.S. collector, the choices are both simple to start and then almost never ending for specialized material. We will start with Scott's Specialized Catalog. If you don't go any further than reading all the material in the first 90 or so pages, you will be ahead of many collectors. In you decide on early U.S. material, you can't go wrong with The Scott Identification Guide to U.S Stamps (Figure 4, on Front Cover). The late Charles Micarelli, a former member and President of the Central Florida Stamp Club, developed this reference that clears up some of the identification problems when dealing with early U.S. It is readily available at \$39.95.

At this point I need to call a temporary halt. If I had the time and space the article could go on to list books on: a single stamp, a stamp series, stamps issued in a century, gum, paper, printing, color, watermarks, grills, coils, booklets....and on it goes! And, don't forget - we didn't even get around to mentioning covers. Now, for a challenge - if enough interest is shown, I can present a program showing these items and many more. It all starts with a little interest... and a book!

 reading -- especially if you view them from the perspective of the time frame of issue.]
