



Dear Members and Friends,

This letter is to remind and advise that effective on 1 April 1977 the Central Florida Stamp Club, Inc., will move its meeting place from the Winter Park Public Library to the John Young Museum and Planetarium on East Rollins Street in Orlando. The Museum is near the Florida Hospital, and is located on a nameless street, one block west of Mills Avenue (\tilde{U}_*S_* 17-92) and is between East Rollins Street (on which Florida Hospital faces) and Princeton Street. The Museum is located in Loch Haven Park and is the building with the large dome on top. There is PLENTY of parking in front of the building in the Parking Lot, and the MAIN ENTRANCE will open for us at 7:30 P.M. Our first meeting in this new location will be on Thursday, 7 April 1977, and will commence at 8:00 P.M.

The John Young Museum and Planetarium (formerly Central Florida Museum) was re-named in honor of a local boy, NASA Apollo Astronaut John W. Young, and came into being through a sense of need and the dedication of a group of local citizens in 1948. The Museum and Planetarium was incorporated in 1955 as the Central Florida Museum. Through donations of individuals and organizations, along with a bond sale, ground was broken in 1959, and the first building completed in 1960. In 1968 the museum dedicated a new, general purpose meeting room which enabled program expansion of a wide range of lectures, etc. In 1971 major expansion was completed, making this facility one of the finest and most versatile in the Southeastern United States. Also housed in the museum is the Orange County Historical Society.

John Yeung was born in San Francisco, 24 September 1930, but his family moved to Orlando when he was a youngster, and it was here that he lived and attended school, graduationg from the old Orlando High School. He attended and received his Bachelor of Science Degree in Aeronautical Engineering at the Georgia Institute of Technology. Captain (U.S. Navy) Young was selected as an astronaut by NASA in September 1962. He first served as pilot with Command Pilot Gus Grissom on the first manned GEMINI Flight - a 3-orbit mission launched 23 March 1965. He was back up pilot for GEMINI 6. On July 18, 1966, John Young occupied the command pilot seat for the GEMINI 10 mission, with Michael Collins as pilot, and effected a successful rendezvous and docking with the AGENA target vehicle. In the APOLLO program his first assignment was as back up command module pilot for APOLLO 7. He was command module pilot for APOLLO 10, May 18-26, 1969, and was accompanied on this 248,000 nautical mile lunar mission by Thomas P. Stafford and Eugene A. Cernan, and descended to within 8 miles of the lunar surface and accurately photographed the site for the APOLLO 11 landing. He then served as back up spacecraft commander for APOLLO 13 and made his FOURTH space flight as the spacecraft commander of APOLLO 16 on April 16-27, 1972. With him on the fifth manned lunar landing mission were Thomas C. Mattingly, II and Charles M. Duke, Jr. APOLLO 16 was the first scientific expedition to inspect,
