Voices from the Past by Phil Fettig

We all collect lots of different things. I have one interest that I suspect not too many others do - Reading old stamp publications. A sample from the past follows from the *Weekly Philatelic Gossip* - June 19, 1937: (Published in Holton, KS)

- (1) At the time Amelia Earhar's plane crashed in Honolulu, it was said she placed her 6,500 souvenir flight envelopes in the hands of the Honolulu postmaster for safekeeping. At this writing she is winging her way eastward, from South America to Africa, but the press seems to be silent on those covers she left in Honolulu, but presumably she has them with her. (Phil's note: Of course, we know she never completed the entire trip, having disappeared on July 2nd, 1937.)
- (2) Stamp collecting in England has now reached the proportions that one man is making a living by searching the Whitehall dump and tearing the stamps off discarded envelopes.
- (3) Arrangements have been made in Japan for a 10-day mail service between that country and the United States by the Communications Ministry and Pan American Airways. The mail will be picked up by Chinese operated planes at Shanghai and flown to Hong Kong, from there it will take clipper wings to Manila and onwards to San Francisco.
