




## The Things You Find.....

My family name is derived from King Fergus the Great of Scotland (d. 645ad). Alternate spellings of my surname can be found as "Fergusson" which is common in the Caribbean Islands. The name is frequently found in both Ireland, Scotland and the Isle of Mann. The name derives from the Gaelic language with the meaning "the angry (one)" or "the wrathful (one)." Up until the middle 1980s, I was the only Francis Ferguson in the Orlando phone book — that is no longer true (What is a phone book?). I have occasionally encountered other Fergusons

during my 61 years on this planet. Oddly I have no family members who carry my surname, as my only uncle who passed away a couple of years ago at the age of 93 had no children. My twin brothers (James & John) did not have any children either, so that makes me the last of my family line.

I attempted to find out some information about "Fergussons Wharf" — but ran into a total dead end. There is simply no information of substance online to be found. This cover was sent October 20, 1898 to Southington, Connecticut; as shown by the front and back stamp. The following quote was all I could really find of significance: "While we are confident that Fergus-

son's Wharf was located in Isle of Wight County, (VA) we don't know its actual location within the county."

It is an interesting cover that invokes my family history. You never know what you find!
