

Word is that Jim Archbold and Stephen Strobel are experiencing some health challenges and we all wish Jim and Stephen a swift and full recovery! Get well soon!



Cover Story: Philatelic Organizations by Mike Schumacher

Throughout the world there are many philatelic organizations, Maybe almost as many as there are stamps to collect. This article will cover a (very) few of them.

The first logo depicted on the cover page is from the Royal Philatelic Society of London (RSPL). The RSPL is the oldest philatelic society in the world. It was founded April 10, 1869 and is headquartered in London, England. The first meeting was held at stamp dealer J.C. Wilsons place at 93 Great Russell Street. The use of the prefix "Royal" was granted by King Edward VII in November 1906. The Duke of York Prince George (later King George V) was an avid collector and served as honorary VP of the RSPL from 1893 to 1910. He had been the recipient of his father's collection (King Edward VII). This collection is known as the Royal Philatelic Collection. The Royal Family continues to be a patron of the RSPL. The RSPL has over 2,200 members in numerous countries around the world. Amongst it's mission objectives is "to promote, encourage, and contribute to the advancement of the science and practice of philately...to



establish and maintain a library and collection of stamps, designs, proofs, essays and other articles of interest...of the Society". The RSPL publishes "The London Philatelist".

The second logo on the cover page is from the American Philatelic Society (APS). The APS is the largest philatelic society in the world. It was originally named the American Philatelic Association. It was

established in New York on September 14, 1886. It's first president was John K. Tiffany. Membership in the 1940s totaled over 4,000 including U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The APS's first office was located at State College, Pennsylvania. By the mid-1990s APS's staff and services had grown and needed to find a larger facility. In the early 2000s, the APS purchased and began renovating an old match factory in Bellefonte, Pennsylvania. In June 2004, the American Philatelic Center was dedicated and houses the American Philatelic Research Library. The APS continues to publish a monthly issue of *The American Philatelist*, which is one of the oldest philatelic magazines in the world. The first issue was published in January 1887. The American Philatelic Center also provides a number of



educational learning opportunities. Stamps can be purchased through their on-line stamp store. The APS also organizes the annual Great American Stamp Show. U.S. membership is \$45.00 annually.

The third logo on the front page belongs to the Royal Philatelic Society of Canada (RPSC). The RPSC is the premier national philatelic organization in Canada. It was formed in 1919 as the Winnipeg Stamp Society and changed it's name in 1920 to the Canadian Philatelic Association and then changed it's name again in 1923 to the Canadian Philatelic Society. In 1959 it received permission to add "Royal" to it's name. The RSPC publishes a by monthly journal titled *The Canadian Philatelist*. The first issue was published in 1950. The RSPC has chapters throughout Canada.



The British North America Philatelic Society (BNAPS) is an affiliate of the RSPC. The BNAPS was founded in 1943 and is an international organization focused on the "collecting and study of the stamps, markings, and postal history of Canada and the preconfederation colonies of British North America. BNAPS publishes a journal titled *BNA Topics*.



Another affiliate of the RPSC is the Postal History Society of Canada (PHSC). It was originally founded in 1972 as the Postal History Society of Ontario and changed it's name in 1977. PHSC's mission is dedicated to the study of Canadian and early North American colonies postal history.

The fourth logo shown on the cover page is that of the Scandinavian Philatelic Society. The Society began as the Scandinavian Collectors Club. It was founded in the United Kingdom in 1952. Throughout

it's sixty year history society members have met in the Library of the Swedish Church in Marylebone, London. It's mission is to promote the collection of Stamps, Postcards, and Postal History of the Scandinavian Countries. (Denmark, Faroe Islands, Finland, Greenland, Norway, Sweden, Iceland, Aland as well as Danish West Indies and the Norwegian territory of Spitsbergen)



(Colors of the Scandinavian country flags shown to the right.) > ______ The society also has an extensive library of Scandinavian Philatelic material for research purposes.

A similar organization in the United States is the Scandinavian Collectors Club (SCC). It's members are also dedicated to the collecting and studying the postage stamps, postcards and postal history of the Scandinavian countries. It began and was founded in Delaware in 1935, as the Finnish-American Stamp Club. It changed it's name in 1942 to the Scandinavian Collectors Club of New York. It's final name change came in 1960 when it started chapters around the country, when it adopted it's current name. The SCC has published its quarterly journal the *Posthorn* since 1943. The SCC's library is located at the Rocky Mountain Philatelic Library in Denver, Colorado.



The American Topical Association was founded in November 1949 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin by 17-yearold Jerome (Jerry) Husak in his bedroom. His idea was to get friends together to share topical collecting



ideas. Within five months there were over 400 members. The ATA issued the first copy of its journal *Topical Times* later that year. The ATA held its first national convention in 1952. Since 2018, the ATA has partnered with the APS on sponsoring a national stamp show. In 2020 the American First Day Cover Society joined this partnership in helping to organize the Great American Stamp Show which is held at various locations around the country. The ATA's mission is to serve the World of Thematic Philately. Topical collectors focus on specific topics and themes represented on stamps. The ATA provides checklists for various topics and is involved in publishing books. Members are

also active in exhibiting at stamp shows.



The American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors (AAPE) is a worldwide organization of stamp collectors who competitively exhibit at stamp shows. Their mission is to encourage participation and enjoyment of exhibiting while also pursuing the betterment of exhibiting, judging practices and standards. The organization was founded in 1986. It publishes a quarterly journal titled the *Philatelic Exhibitor*. AAPE works to update and maintain the manual on judging standards and procedures.

Aside from national philatelic societies there are many state level organizations like the Florida Postal History Society (FPHS). The FPHS was founded in 1978 by a group of collectors interested in studying the postal history of Florida. Interest waned due to lack of interest, meetings and a formal publication. However, the society restarted in 1991 and has published the *Florida Postal History Journal* since July 1993. FPHS holds their meetings at the Sarasota and FLOREX stamp shows.

Obviously this article can not cover all of the various philatelic societies and organizations that exist, but is intended to introduce club members to some of the organizations that can help to further ones interest in various collecting areas. Many of our club members belong to other philatelic organizations and I encourage them to do a write up about their favorite organizations that can be used in future newsletters to enlighten other club members about these groups.

Where are these places? by Mike Schumacher



Teutopolis, Ill. Is located in south eastern Illinois. Teutopolis means "City of the Teutons" (Germans). It is located on the Cumberland Trail, now known as U.S. Route 40.

A thousand acres of land was claimed for homestead purpose by John F. Waschefort in July 1839. The town site was surveyed and platted by William J. Hankins. The first school house was opened in 1841. Clemens Uptmor was the first postmaster of Teutopolis when

the first post office opened in 1842. In 1846 the Indianapolis-St. Louis stage coach line had a change station at Jacob Fulle's tavern and stable. Teutopolis was also the

site of the "Dutchtown War". Rumors were circulating in 1867 that the Dutchtown Catholics were preparing for a war to exterminate the Protestants in the area and were bringing a cannon to the area. Once spies confirmed the presence of the cannon a guard company was formed to repel the invasion. However, when the suspected cannon was determined to be pipes for the new church organ the troops were disbanded. (If all wars could be so short!) The village Hall was built in 1888 and served as the Fire Station; community meetings; a school room and for showing movies. In 1898, the Teutopolis Press was started. In 1902, the telephone system and service was built by village President and resident Physician Dr. F.N. Hoffman. The first automobile arrived in 1909, owned of course by Dr. Hoffman. In 1916 a government agent was stationed there to seek out pro-German plotters. And the history of Teutopolis carries on from there to present day with a current population of about 1,600 people.

Topsfield, Mass. Is located just north of Boston.



The area was first inhabited by the Agawam Indians, led by Chief Masconomet. European explorers brought smallpox to the area and decimated the Indian people. In 1633, John Winthrop the Younger and a group of settlers took up residence in the area. They called it New Meadows. In 1648 it was renamed Topsfield (after Toppesfield, England). One of the



first settlers was Robert Smith. Five generations of the family would live there through the years. Joseph Smith Sr. was born there in 1771 and would later go on to found the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. The Reverend Joseph Capen was hired by the village to lead the Congregational Church in 1684. The Capen House is a National Historical Landmark. In 1692, like other villages in the area - the Salem witch trials impacted Topsfield as well. A number of local women were accused of being witches and were hanged. In later years, many men from Topsfield served in the American Revolution and the Civil War. Over the years the area developed from a farming and shoe manufacturing community to one of many large estates. Current population about 6,600.



Owenton, KY. Is located in northern Kentucky and was founded in 1822 and incorporated in 1828. It is the county seat of Owen County, which was named after Col. Abraham Owen who died in the battle of Tippecanoe serving as an aide-de-camp to William Henry Harrison. Owenton saw limited growth in the 19th century as no railroad was built to connect it. The town's buildings and architecture remains pretty much unchanged. Current population is about 1,600.




Other notable residents who hail from Owenton include: World War II flying ace Lt. General Gerald W. Johnson (USAF); Olympic gold medalist and U.S. Navy vice admiral Willis A. Lee Jr. (He won seven medals {5 gold} in the 1920s Olympics for shooting); Mormon pioneer and second mayor of Salt Lake City, Utah, Abraham Smoot

and Major League relief pitcher for the New York Yankees Dale Roberts.

But, first let's talk about how this variety was made. It was the result of an experiment on a master die. Type I master dies were beginning to wear out, so another die was produced by taking a particularly strong impression of a Type I with 10 subjects with increased pressure. A new transfer roll was then created. The result produced a notable difference. The increased pressure with the experimental roll made the engraved lines of the designs appear deeper and wider, as if they had been re-cut. Washington's toga button in particular appears much more defined. Overall detail is also notably clearer than on Type I stamps.

toga rope, which has a solid top line. This is true, but the circle around the button is quite distinct and very

strong. This is where I focus first. Then there is a second

place to look which is always 100% positive ID which

I will discuss later.

This experimental transfer roll was only used on 2 plates. Plate number 10208 and 10209. Plate number 10208 all 400 subjects are type 1A #500's, Plate number 10209 is mixed, mostly type 1A #500's but there are #499's on that sheet.

Let's talk about the positive ID that I eluded to earlier. A #499 has only line of shading on two parts of the ribbon. #500 has one or two extra lines of shading! 7 positions have 2 and 3 positions have 1. It is the positive ID. The transfer roll had 10 positions on it – each of the 10 positions creates a unique shape to the extra shading lines. See the chart above. Arrows point to the extra shading lines. This allows you to collect each of the 10 varieties of the #500! Varieties within a variety – yes I know I am a nerd. The stamp pictured is a certified copy of #500 and appears to me to be position J. No extra line in left ribbon and a partial low extra line of shading on the right (that appears partly connected to ribbon).

One last note about color. The catalogs and much reference material states that the shade for this is a deep carmine rose. Most examples are this very distinct bright shade. But if the stamp has the extra lines of shading in the ribbon it MUST be #500. Do not let color fool you, look at the markers!
