Continuing the expansion of the New York Post Office By Josh Furman

Perhaps you will recall that in March 2022, I did an article for this journal titled, "New York Circular Date Stamp Cancels & Barred Ellipse Oval Killers (AKA -New York Duplex Cancels).

I also showed how the growth of the New York post office engendered new branches, called stations, and that the letter in the killer changed to represent the source of a piece of mail. See Figure 1 for an example of the cancel from Station H.



Cover Story: The Industrial Building Branch Continuing the expansion of the New York Post Office cont.

Even with the addition of all these new stations, the downtown post offices were still overwhelmed by the amount of mail, especially second, third and fourth class mail.

It took some time for the letters I.B.B. to be understood. In 1968, philatelist Arthur H. Bond, of Casselberry, Florida did a multi-page summary of the New York City cancellation types. He described seven different cancel types mostly based on the variations in the CDS, with all having a number or a letter in the barred oval killer. Paragraph 2 of his summary reads, "I.B.B. denotes Industrial Building Branch. Very little is known about this branch."

In January of 2001, John M. Hotchner in LINN'S STAMP NEWS wrote, "I was stumped by the meaning of the I.B.B. in the New York cancel shown in Figure 1..."

Since then, research and scholarship have revealed the I.B.B. story, and I can describe it quite fully in this article today.

So here goes: As I mentioned in a previous paragraph the Postal Service was having trouble keeping up with the flow of mail, especially of second, third and fourth class mail. A plan to use Station O situated at 30 West 13th Street as an uptown distribution point failed to relieve the congestion downtown. Postmaster General Wanamaker appointed a commission to find a location/building capable of relieving the overcrowding.

A search of available properties revealed one clear choice: The Industrial Building. And so it became a distribution center for all mail, especially second class, collected north of 14th Street. See figures 2 and 3 for illustrations of the cancellation types using the I.B.B. initials.


The Industrial Building fronted on Lexington Avenue and the building occupied an entire block, bounded by 43rd and 44th Streets on the north/south and by Depew Place and Lexington on the east/west.

In my previous article I mentioned that Station H moved several times, finally from its location at 156 E.44th St. to the Industrial Building. The Grand Central Post Office was also adjacent to these two branches, so there was plenty of space for expansion of the Post Office system.

Can one collect these cancels? Well, they are not rare, but they are scarce. So far, 66 are known, and use the H killer on some, and numbers on many others. The odd numbers are from one to eleven. These, from my collection, use numbers 7 and 11, for example. Ten cancels are known from 1893 and the balance are all from 1894 with destinations all over the U.S.A. plus quite a few to England, Germany, and one to Italy. Two types are known: a vertical ellipse format with odd numbers between 1 and 11, And a horizontal ellipse with only the numbers #2 and #10 recorded at present.

Bluegrass Forever Stamp Issued March 15th—Owensboro, KY



"Bluegrass music combines elements of country music, sacred songs, string band music, the blues and traditions of Scotland and Ireland into a style that is uniquely American. Inspired by vintage bluegrass concert posters, the stamp art features four acoustic string instruments typical of bluegrass bands: guitar, fivestring banjo, fiddle, and mandolin. Antonio Alcalá, an art director for USPS, designed the stamp with original art by Heather Moulder." USPS PSA

Underground Railway Forever Stamps Issued March 9th—Church Creek, MD

Pane of 20 stamps showing 10 sepia-toned portraits of men and women who escaped slavery and/or helped others escape. Individuals include: Catharine Coffin, Fredrick Douglas, Thomas Garrett, Laura Haviland, Lewis Hayden, Harriet Jacobs, William Lambert, Jermain Loguen, William Still and Harriet Tubman. On the reverse side of the sheet is a map showing the routes taken by the freedom seekers and a brief biography of the individuals. The stamps were

designed by artist Antonio Alcalá using existing

The stamp features a horizontal graphic illustration of brilliantly colored flowers rendered in ink and gouache paint. Derry Noyes, an art director for USPS, designed the stamp using an existing illustration by artist Kim Parker.

Philately Meets Portraiture: Covers by John Kaul



On my recent trip to Minnesota, I had the opportunity to visit the Groveland Gallery in Minneapolis, MN and see an exhibition of hand painted covers by John Kaul. John Kaul (77) started collecting stamps around the age of 10, as a result of his father bringing home envelopes from work that originated from around the world. He indicates that he learned about history, geography and a variety of other subjects as a result of stamp collecting.

By the age of 18, he supplemented his stamp collecting interests with a new hobby—"quotation enthusiast". While reading a book, he happened upon a phrase that captivated his attention. He began compiling a data base of interesting phrases on 3 by 5 index cards. Currently he has accumulated some 10,000 quotations from people all over the world. He spent a 48 year career working at the Minnesota State Capital as a staffer and lobbyist.

As the years went by, he would send letters to folks and always tried to make them interesting and connect them with interests of the letter recipient. This led to melding his interest in stamp and quotation collecting with his interest in painting. Thus, on display at the exhibition were some 50 hand painted covers from the 200+ covers that he has created over the years of famous people accompanied with a quotation from the individual and stamps associated with the individual. A few of them are shown below.



















All of these works of art were on larger size envelopes and were selling in the \$200 to \$500 range.

Talk about collecting what interests a person, John Kaul seems to have mastered that in so many ways!



Wow - Strange!

Listing: "Sealed Sheet Packs of Stamps - 8,000 Stamps Scott #O127 Catalog Value: \$2k" Starting bid of \$49.99, free shipping, 14 day return policy.

This is a strange listing and I have seen a lot of listing over the last 25 years. The listing notes that the 4 packs are unopened and sealed. The value of stamps maybe a little hard to read – 1 Cent Official stamps, with 2,000 in each pack. Total value per pack of \$20.

The problem is the stamps have NO VALUE in the resale market. Official stamps can only be used for official government business. Use in the private sector is strictly prohibited. The listing states that there is an aggregate catalog value of \$2,000. Really? What would the marketplace do with 8,000 stamps all at once? I wonder......

Have You been to Mexico?

Some of us may have taken that winter vacation to Mexico (especially those of us from the northern climates to get away from the winter weather). But that is not the Mexico I am talking about here in this article.



I am referring to Mexico, N.Y. Mexico, N.Y. is located in northeastern Oswego County in north central N.Y. In the past it has been referred to as the "Mother of Towns" because in 1792 – 1796 it consisted of an area that was eventually divided into six counties. These six counties today include 84 separate towns. The




town of Mexico, N.Y. also includes a village by the name of Mexico. In 1798 the population was 25. Both the town and village of Mexico grew rather quickly as a result of saw and oil mills, tanneries, black-smiths, distilleries, barrel making, shoe-shops, hotels, jewelers and other general merchandise businesses. A stage and mail route ran from Mexico to Oswego, until the railroad came through the area. Early Postmasters included: Rawson Butler, Starr Clark and S.B. Barnes.

The spring wagon was invented there by Lewis Miller, which played an important role in settlers heading west. Lulu Brown made pans of baked beans in the local grocery in 1937, which evolved into Grandma Brown's Baked Beans. Mexico's first school teacher was Harriet Easton (1811) in Shuball Alfred's barn. By 1813 the public school system in Mexico was established in the area.

In 1835, the citizens of Mexico signed and sent petitions to Washington D.C. requesting the abolishment of slavery. Asa Wing was a lecturer and traveled across the state urging voters to encourage their legislators to pass laws prohibiting ownership of slaves. Asa and Caroline Wing also used their house as a way station for the Underground Railroad. Asa died in 1854 at the age of 38. Several thousand people attended his funeral including Frederick Douglass who praised Asa's lecturing skills in his eulogy. The station master of Mexico, Starr Clark was a leader in the Underground Railroad. Caroline (Asa's wife) earned a living after Asa's death by boarding teachers from the Mexico Academy. Asa's diary entries tell of their attendance at the October 1850 convention of the Liberty Party, where Abolitionist Gerrit Smith was nominated for President and Samuel Ringgold Ward, an African American minister was nominated for Vice President and Asa served on the Finance committee. Franklin Pierce won the election in 1852.

(Just another one of those interesting philatelic postmark finds at the Maitland Stamp Show.)






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
