



The stamp selected for the covers is the new Benjamin Franklin stamp issued by the U.S. Post Office on July 23, 2025 to honor the 250th anniversary of the Post Office.

The General Francis Marion Stamp Club from Ocala will have a table and display some posters that their club members made for promoting Stamp Collecting Month in October. The USPS will have a booth with Stamps available for sale.

And of course there will be philatelic exhibits and educational presentations.

Questionable eBay, # 36

.Altered Reality: Party of Two.



Listing reads: "ERROR US 2C BLOCK PRESIDENTIAL SERIES WITH HORIZONTAL MISPERF" -- bidding starts at \$62.70 with a 20% coupon available for use. Free shipping and no returns accepted.

This fairly well-established seller is seeing something here that no one else sees. This block of four is representative of much of the production of the Presidential Series which was not known for being centered well. This is not anything special.

The realistic value of this block of four is zero.

Listing reads: "Freak eRROR STAMP 1938 5 CENTS US STAMP JAMES MONROE dEVIL PSYCHEDELIC vISION OF". Quoted exactly as it appears with all the typos. Bidding starts at \$74.99, with shipping of \$12.90 from Canada, returns are not accepted.

This long-established seller dabbles in selling a little bit of everything from fishing rods to cast iron pans to dolls and even a Boy Scout knife (like I used to own!) – there is a small representation of wildly priced stamps to entice the unaware buyer.

These two sellers are not grounded in reality. Nothing here is of any philatelic value to anyone who has any common sense. P.T. Barnum would be very happy indeed.

I continue to maintain -- these kinds of listings just pollute the philatelic ecosystem and skew the environment for beginners.



OHHH CANADA!

I have always had a fascination for Canadian stamps. Back in the late 70s to 80s, I had a very nice stock. Until I recently looked at my auction catalogues from the early 80s, did I remember how large it was. And how high the prices were back then compared to now.

The Victoria issues were printing masterpieces. Edward VII issues through George V admirals were very nice. One of my favorites is # 95, the top value of the 1903-1908 issue. It is notoriously badly centered. Any VF or better ones I come across, I buy as they are scarce. Most used examples have heavy cancels. As far as unused, most will have hinge remnants and NH are very scarce. A scan below shows one of the nicest ones I have owned. With a PF cert, OG, genuine, I listed it in my Dec 5, 1980 auction with a CV then of \$600.00 and my estimate was \$ 900-\$ 1100. It sold for \$ 1250.00. That price would never happen today.



I recently bought a very nice Canadian collection from a CFSC member dealer. The original owner had home made pages with descriptions and info on each stamp. It spanned the Jubilee issue to modern. Most stamps had LH singles and Blocks of 4 with the top 2 LH/H and the bottom 2 NH. The condition was mostly VF/+ and sound. My favorite stamp (#95) only had a single and not a block.


Also I bought some beautiful Victorian material from the Kelleher "Mount Royal" collection in June.

They probably will be my "estate pieces" as I would rather enjoy them and not sell them at very low prices. I'm waiting for about 20 graded items to come back from PSE.

I sent many nice examples to William Crowe for graded certs. He was a wonderful expertizer who recently passed, provided a great and affordable service to dealers and collectors. He will be greatly missed.

Let's talk about The Bluenose, # 158, one of the most famous Canadian stamps. I recently broke out a very nice block of 4 and got certs on all of them. The best one was graded by Bill Crowe as 95, OG, NH XF/Superb. It was one of the nicest ones I have come across. Scott CV \$ 425.00 SMQ \$ 1250.00. It sold for \$175.00 on July 30. I regret even posting it for sale. This is how low the market is now.

The point I wanted to make is that these beautiful Canadian stamps, even with certs have a hard time selling for 20% of Scott CV. Some lesser quality, but still sound, might sell for 10% CV. Faulty stamps, forget it. It is a great time to buy VF stamps at a very low price.

PSE (SMQ) provides a great link for pricing graded Canadian stamps. Good luck selling at those prices, but it is a guide. The link is below:



This is an example of a stamp I just listed on eBay, Canada # 50, with a PSE cert. graded 95 XF/Superb, NH It is from the "Mount Royal" collection. PSE SMQ value is \$775.00 (versus Scott VF, NH of \$275.00). I listed it for \$ 250.00 and thought it would not sell (per my first draft of this article) but to prove me wrong, it just sold for \$355.00! Now this is abnormal for the current Canadian market. If that was a U.S. stamp from the 1890s with that grade and SMQ value it would sell in a day.

As to Canadian provinces, my favorite is Newfoundland. The stamps are very well designed and the engraving is superb. The imperfs are available in blocks and very affordable. The airmails are so interesting. I have a First Edition (1953) of "Newfoundland Airmails 1919-1939" Ex philatelic library of George T. Turner. I have owned this interesting book since the 1970s. In the back is an attached "Newfoundland and Labrador Road map" published by Esso!!



I always liked the 1931 issue (C 8-11) and the DO-X overprint (C 12). The quantities issued were low. Also the Edward VII Officially Sealed Dead Letter Office stamp (OX1) on blue paper is an engraved masterpiece. Along with the Canada Victoria stamps (OX2-3). See scans below.





Just an interesting note. When I started doing public auctions in 1980, the task of printing catalogues was very cumbersome compared to now. In order to print front and back covers in color, I had to go to New Hampshire to a printer who used a huge old German printing machine. He used 4 color separation (CMYK: cyan, magenta, yellow, and black). Each color would be printed on a plastic-like sheet and when all four were done, they were laid on top of each other to form the total colors. This would go to the printer of the catalogues. An expensive procedure. This was before computers were in common use and I had to buy this huge IBM machine that you would type the text out and was recorded on a cassette-like tape and then printed out. I believe that machine cost over \$2,000.00. And making the black and white photos were very time consuming. How technology has changed!

I hope this article was enjoyable!

A Little Downunder Philately

A highlight of my recent visit to Australia was finding and meeting some members of the philatelic community in North Sydney.

It began when the stamp collector friendly postmaster in Normanhurst connected me with a fellow stamp collector. Morgan graciously invited me to her home to see some of her collection, chat about stamps and have tea. Her specialty, Japanese stamps is amazing.


In turn, she introduced me to several stamp clubs in the area including the Castle Hill Club. They welcome guests and their September meeting fit into my schedule, so I attended. Their normal program is general business, a presentation and a brief member's show and tell. I was fascinated to learn about the Kangaroo And Map Series stamp of Australia from one of their members that evening. He showed us an extensive and beautifully displayed collection. Attached is an illustration of a few of these stamps that I have in my collection.

As listed in the Scott catalog, the kangaroo and map image was featured on more than 40 stamps from 1913-1936. In addition there are multiple variants identified by several dies, different colors, watermarks and perforations. (See figure 1) I regret not taking photos of some of his wonderful exhibits of the stamps, though I did take a photo (See figure 2) that illustrates several of the dies from the catalog of specialized stamps that he had there.

Alongside the more common specimens, he showed us several rare examples of stamps in his collection including one of the only three mint examples known to exist of the 1915 2 and 1/2 penny stamps that has a missing "1" from the fraction.

At the end of the meeting, the club asked me to convey their greetings to my club, Central Florida Stamp Club. I took forward to visiting The Castle Hill Stamp Club again and perhaps some of the other clubs in the area on my next visit.

As we pause and take time to give thanks, we might ponder Thanksgiving philatelically and how it became the holiday it is today. Stamps that have a connection to Thanksgiving include:

The 1994 "Freedom From Want" stamp featuring Norman Rockwell's famous painting of family and friends gathered around the dinner table for a turkey dinner. The stamp is one from the set of Four Freedom



stamps (Freedom of Speech, Freedom of Worship, Freedom From Want & Freedom from Fear) issued for the 100th anniversary of Norman Rockwell's birth. Rockwell created the paintings as part of Roosevelt's 1941 World War II campaign to educate Americans about participation in the war. The four paintings were published in the Saturday Evening Post in four successive issues from February 20th through March 13th, 1941 each one accompanied with an essay with the same name of the painting. Subsequently the drawings were used on posters to promote the sale of War Bonds. The four stamps were issued in a souvenir sheet produced by Ashton-Potter USA Ltd., using offset lithography in 1994.

The 2008 "Thanksgiving Day Parade" set of four stamps, because what would Thanksgiving be without

the Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade on television? These stamps were designed by Howard E. Paine and issued in a pressure-sensitive adhesive pane of 20 stamps. Postmark locations for first day cancels were—Fort Myers, Cape Coral and Naples, FL.





The 2001 "We Give Thanks" stamp was issued in October 2001 as the first Holiday Celebrations stamp to spotlight the traditional family gathering of Thanksgiving. The stamp was designed by Richard Sheaff and illustrated by Margaret Cusack. The stamps were printed by Ashton-Potter USA Ltd., in sheets of 25 stamps using lithograph printing.

The 1956 "Wildlife Conversation—Wild Turkey" 3 cent stamp, because what is Thanksgiving without turkey? The stamp was issued in Fond du Lac, Wisconsin at the Wisconsin Federation of Stamp Clubs convention. The stamp was designed by Robert W. Hines. The stamps were printed on the Stickney rotary press using intaglio printmaking technique.



The 1920 "Pilgrim Tercentenary—Mayflower" one cent stamp, (from a set of three stamps issued for the Pilgrim Tercentenary) because without the arrival of the Pilgrims, there wouldn't have been a need for the




Native Americans (members of the Wampanoag Tribe) to assist them with survival in 1621. The stamp was printed by the Bureau of Engraving and Printing using the flat plate method of printing. First day of issue was in Plymouth, and Provincetown, MA on the 300th anniversary of the landing of 102 travelers seeking freedom of religion in America. The design of the stamp was inspired by a photograph in the Smithsonian Museum's collection.


The 2025 "Powwows—Gathering of Nations" set of four stamps. The stamps were issued in Albuquerque, NM during the Gathering of Nations Powwow with more than 100,000 attendees. The goal of the stamps is to honor the culture and heritage of Indigenous people. The stamps were designed by Antonio Alcala and showcase original paintings by Cochiti Pueblo and artist Mateo Romero.




And the 2016 "George Washington & Abraham Lincoln" stamps, because it was Washington who issued a proclamation in 1789 creating the first Thanksgiving & Lincoln who established Thanksgiving as a national holiday, by proclamation in 1863, hoping to unite the country. 
