Date Line, Little Switzerland, North Carolina; 10.17.16

The simple joys of gazing out a window to see the scenery of trees, trees and more trees is sublime. It is truly wonderful to escape the urban living to enjoy what nature has to offer. 

Serendipity — XXIV by The Editor

Investment? United Nations? Really?

Being a stamp collector often has some unexpected twists to contend with. Recently a long-time professional colleague approached me to help her tame a large ugly purple bag and one medium sized suitcase of material left to her. The material has a rather long and twisted story that involves a multi-generational passing of the material. Long story, short — Sharon has her great uncles “collection” of material. Why do I use the quotes? Well the material was not organized in anyway that made sense. The material which has a weight of about 30 pounds after removing all the cardboard and other packing materials — is in absolutely pristine condition other than a minuscule damage that was inflicted because of brown masking tape that over the last 50+ years has turned to goo —and stained those stamps it was in direct contact with. That is the good news. The bad news is, there are 543 sheets of United Nations from the middle 1950s to the middle 1960s.

There is also a smattering of Vatican, U.S. FDCs, and other minor stuff. The catalog value of the material is in the \$9,500 range — while the real world value is a tiny fraction of that. A recent investigation online has shown that many of the sheets sell in the \$1 to \$3 range — wait for it — when they actually do sell. As it has turned out a postcard discovered in the collection shed a great deal of light on the reason why this material was bought. The reverse of the card shown at the left, reads “4-18-66, Dear Mr. Glayik, Received my order in good shape today & am very pleased. I hope you have some thing else in U.N. as I have more money to invest. Let me hear from you. Thanks John.” Was this a solid financial investment? It may have appeared to John from his perspective of the time period to be a good one. Sadly that “investment” did not turn out well — at all. My colleague Sharon, will end up donating the material to Birds of Prey or Habitat for the Humanities to allow her to take a taxable donation. The material is expected to end up with the CFSC for dispersal at the highest possible price. Sad story, however it happens all to often.


