SECTION ONE

United States Issues Scott 3549, 3550 and B2

Second Quickest Stamp Issued Between Event Date and Issue Date

- To the best of my knowledge the "United We Stand" stamps were the second quickest stamps to be issued by the United States
- Quickest Stamp was the Harding Memorial Stamps (Scott Numbers 610 and 612)
 - President Harding died on August 2, 1923
 - Flat plate printing stamp (610) issued September 1, 1923 29 days
 - Rotary press printing stamp (612) issued September 12, 1923 41 days
- Three of the "United We Stand" stamps (Scott Numbers 3549, 3550 and 3550A) were issued October 24, 2001
 - This was 43 days after the event
 - The fourth stamp (Scott number 3249B) was issued January 2, 2002
 - Note that the First Day Covers for 3249B still used the October 24, 2001 date
- The Semi-Postal "Heroes of 2001" was issued on June 7, 2002


Various Coil Stamps

Top Four Rows

3550 – Coil of 100 – Serpentine cut 9¾ in continuous format. Backing is the same height as the stamp. Three plate numbers were used over the duration of printing.

Bottom Two Rows

3550A – Coil of 10,000 – Simulated serpentine cut of 9¾ with 2mm space between stamps on backing higher than stamp. Only one plate number was used





After the September 11 acts of terrorism on New York, New York, Washington, D.C. and Somerset County, Pennsylvania, the United States Postal Service received thousands of requests for a new patriotic stamp. In response, the United We Stand stamp featuring the flag, the symbol of American freedom and way of life, was issued.

With every lotter bearing this stamp, a message of America's unity and resolve is sent. Our determination and will to rally after these acts of terrorism and return to the simple and routine activities that are a part of everyday life is shown.

Normalcy includes sending and receiving mail. Mail is critical to the infrastructure of the United States. For more than 225 years, mail has bound this nation together. It keeps people in touch with each other and is an important element in moving the economy. Postmaster General and CEO John E. Potter has said that, "Keeping the mail moving is the most important thing the Postal Service can do as our nation moves forward in the aftermath of the September 11 terrorist attacks, and this stamp is a reminder of our commitment to the American people and the spirit of unity we all share."

United We Stand to maintain the enduring freedoms of America and preserve the American way of life for ourselves, our children and others. United We Stand in the use of America's humanitarian, economic and military resources to fight terrorism around the world. United We Stand for liberty and the pursuit of happiness. United We Stand to uphold America as a beacon of peace and justice in the world.

Just in case you are unable to comprehend the full meaning of the letterhead, which is directed to you and Al-Qaeda, let us provide you with some clarification which, hopefully, will erase from your mind any doubts regarding our intentions. B2 – Heros of 2001 Issued June 7, 2002

- Used part of probably the most famous photo of the disaster by Thomas E. Franklin of the newspaper The Record of Hachensack, NJ
- Semi-Postal with the initial extra charge (11¢) going to the Fund for the Families of those killed or injured (34¢ + 11¢)
- When the funds were distributed each family received \$10,000
- After June 30, 2002 the postage part of the stamp increased due to a rate change but the total cost remained the same. The new division of the 45¢became 37¢ + 8¢
- Issued as a pane of twenty stamps
 - Four printing with plate numbers P1111, P2222, P3333 and P4444
- Was on sale until December 31, 2004 and raised \$10,565,073 for the families
- Ashton-Potter printed 205 million stamps with just over 133 million sold.










Saint Vincent and the Grenadines First and Second Anniversaries




Several Countries Used the Theme Terrorism Instead of "United We Stand"
